PEOPLE OF THE RED EARTH

In 1868, Northern Cheyenne and Sioux warriors attacked over fifty men who were under Major George Forsyth and Lieutenant Beecher at what is now known as Beecher Island in northeastern Colorado - - a stretch of land which was surrounded mostly by a dry streambed but offered trees for shelter. The Indians had the men trapped on the island for nine days. It was during this Battle of Beecher Island that the greatly respected Cheyenne warrior Roman Nose was killed. Although Roman Nose had been through many battles, he was considered invincible because of a war bonnet he possessed. This war bonnet had been connected with a vision Roman Nose had as a boy while fasting for four days, in which he had seen a snake with a single horn on its head. One of the most famous Cheyenne medicine men, White Bull, later made a war bonnet for Roman Nose, which had a headband with only one buffalo horn rather than two, rising over the center of the forehead. No materials made by non-Indians, such as thread, cloth, or metal, were used to fashion the war bonnet, and White Bull told Roman Nose that he must never eat anything that metal had touched; if he followed these instructions, the war bonnet would make him invincible. As a result, whenever Roman Nose was a guest in another person's lodge, before he ate any food the warrior always asked if it had been prepared with metal utensils. However, a few days prior to the Battle of Beecher Island he had neglected to ask this important

question and later learned that a Sioux woman had lifted his bread from a pan with an iron fork.

Knowing the protective power of his war bonnet had been broken, Roman Nose was hesitant to lead a charge against army troops without going through the proper purification ceremony. However, he was asked to do so, and not wanting to disappoint his fellow warriors, Roman Nose consented. As he led the charge towards the island, he was shot in the small of the back. At first, nobody knew he had been shot since he stayed on his horse, rode back to the Indian line, and only then lay down on the ground. He died the next morning.

That same year, Black Kettle, the Southern Cheyenne who had pleaded for peace only to be attacked at Sand Creek, asked for protection from the soldiers at Fort Cobb, Oklahoma. Again he was refused and led his band to the Washita River, where they were attacked by Colonel George Armstrong Custer. Many Cheyennes were killed, and all their tipis, clothing, and food were burned. The attack occurred on November 29, 1868, exactly four years to the day after Black Kettle had survived the Sand Creek Massacre. This time the man who only wanted his people to live in peace was not so fortunate. He and his wife were shot as they tried to escape on the same horse, their bodies falling in the creek and being trampled by cavalry horses.

Colorado Tribes in Indian Territory

Life in Indian Territory, later called Oklahoma, was not pleasant for the tribes that had formerly ranged along the mountains and rivers of eastern Colorado. Confinement brought more diseases, including measles, tuberculosis, and whooping cough. Commercial hide hunters had exterminated he buffalo by 1879 (the last wild buffalo in Colorado were observed in Lost Park in 1897). The starving people in Indian Territory were often forced to kill their horses to survive. All tribal populations declined drastically.

In 1890, new hope was kindled among many displaced tribes by the introduction of the Ghost Dance. It was believed that if the dance were performed faithfully, soon the world would be rid of (Continued on last page.....)

all non-Indians, all dead relatives would come back to life, the buffalo would return, and the world would be as it used to be before the arrival of non-Indians. Government officials benefitted from this belief because if many Indians thought all settlers would soon be gone, it was easier to get them to accept a document called the Dawes Act.

Better known as the Allotment Act, the Dawes Act was passed in 1887, supported by land-hungry settlers as well as people sincerely concerned about the future of the people in Indian Territory. Even a few Indian leaders, such as the famous Comanche Quanah Parker, believed the law would bring equality and prosperity to the Indian people. In the end, however, the Dawes Act did more to deprive Indian people of their land and culture than any other action of the federal government, including open warfare. Under its terms, each Indian received 160 acres to which clear title was given after twenty-five years. The remaining reservation land was opened for homesteading. All mineral rights were lost along with this "excess" land. When the Indians acquired title to their allotments, many sold their land to pay off debts. Soon, those who had sold out were not only poverty-stricken but landless as well.


