Creamy Chicken Tortilla Soup

2 10 oz. cans Rotel diced tomatoes & green chilies, undrained

2 cans (14 oz.) Chicken broth

1 can (16 oz.) No fat traditional refried beans

½ cup canned whole kernal corn, drained

2 cups cooked chicken, shredded

Fried corn tortilla strips and shredded Monterey Jack cheese (optional)

Combine tomatoes and broth in medium saucepan. Stir in beans and corn; bring to a boil. Reduce heat to low and simmer 5 minutes, stirring

frequently.

Add chicken, heat through. Serve topped with tortilla strips and cheese, if desired. Refrigerate leftovers.

Taco Soup

1 lb. ground beef or turkey

1 large onion, chopped or diced

1 can (16oz.) each:

Kidney beans

Chili beans

Garbonzo beans

Diced tomatoes

Corn (undrained)

1-1/2 cups water

1 each 4 oz. Can of green chopped/diced chilies (undrained)

1 pkg. Taco seasoning

1 pkg. dry Ranch style dressing

Brown beef/turkey and onions; drain. Add all other ingredients. Simmer about 20-25 minutes over medium heat and serve. Can be put in a crock pot on low and allow to cook all day.

Eggnog Spice Bundt Cake

1 box spice cake mix (18-1/4 ounces)

1 box instant vanilla or cheesecake pudding & pie filling (4-serving size)

1 cup non-fat vanilla yogurt

1/4 cup canola oil

1 cup light eggnog

1 egg

3 egg whites

1-1/2 cup toasted chopped pecans

powdered sugar

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Coat a nonstick Bundt pan with cooking spray.

Combine cake mix, pudding mix, yogurt, oil, eggnog, egg, and egg whites in a large bowl. Mix until creamy. Stir in pecans.

Pour in prepared pan. Bake 40-45 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool on wire rack and dust with powdered sugar.
